




THE FRYER STORE IN KEUTERVILLE

There had been a Kinder Store too, as they gave a matchbox away with their name on it, Joe and Bill Enneking remembered.


Doctor Blake was the doctor for the Keuterville area in the early days.

HENRY AND KATHERINE (HERBOTH) KUTHER

Henry Kuthers came to Idaho in 1885 and was in Keuterville before May 12, 1888 at which time a petition was sent to Washington, D.C., requesting that the name of the town be changed from St. Peter, as it was called then, to Keuterville. Barney Luchtefeld said he once heard Mr. Kuther say "We will call this place Kutherville because I haven't any boys, and I don't want my name to die out". Henry was the first mail carrier, and built a store and post office in Keuterville in May 1886.




The August Maugg Hotel is the background for the wedding picture of Tillie Maugg to Dominic Romain in 1909.

Fred Romains had the grocery store and post office from 1909 to 1913, Hans Peterson bought the store in 1913. According to a clipping in the Cottonwood Chronicle, the Cottonwood Mercantile owned the store next, until 1925, Mike Hilbert had the store from 1925 to 1937, Charles Goeckner from 1937 to 1944, Jack Hilbert from 1944 to 1956, Lillian Hilbert from 1956 to 1961, Ken Williams from 1961 to 1963, Dick Forsmans from 1963 to 1968, and Charlie and Nellie Poxleitner have had the store since then. The store burnt down October 21, 1971, and was rebuilt.



Joe Enneking had a saloon in Keuterville for a year in the 1890s. Frank Enneking was his brother.



THE PINE VIEW SCHOOL

Located 6 miles south of Keuterville, on ground donated by George Gehring, had many teachers, according to Clarence Lightfield. Mentioned were Maude Thomas, Miss Smell, Miss Hubbard, Miss Oldiham, Mrs. Craig, Mae Neal, Miss Sansky, Mrs. Uhl, Winnifred Hobson, Herman Hussman, Vera and Vinna Maughmer, Mary Jenny, Anne Moriarity, Olivia Hattrup, Mary Hattrup, and Agnes Trukositz.

The School was on the road to Maughmer Point, so was spoken of as the Maugher School.

Alice Sprute taught 18 years at the Pine View School, closing the school in 1959, to continue teaching in the Keuterville School.
