


ALICE SPRUTE

taught the 6th grade in Cotton-wood after the Keuterville School was closed in 1969. She retired in 1979, capping a total of 39 years of teaching.




MRS. LEO MADER retired in 1971 after teaching 30 years, and lives near a daughter in Moscow.

DEEP CREEK SCHOOL

The DEEP CREEK SCHOOL, located 3 miles north of Keuterville had many teachers. G. D. Waltz, Sarah Ellis and Mrs. C. P. Puiliesin were teachers in 1896 and 1897, Jenny Newman in 1899, D. W. Gibbons-1900, Mrs. Flora Parker in 1901. Besides many others, Josie Malich and Ellen Lydia taught. Alice Sprute did her first teaching there in 1937 and 1938. Many men employed at the Hussman Mill sent their children there. When the school was closed was not found out. A Christmas celebration was held yet in December of 1946.

FIRST SCHOOL DAYS IN KEUTERVILLE

Mr. J. H. Uhlenkott went to Mt. Idaho to speak with Judge Robbins, then exofficio superintendent of schools, about opening a school. Arrangements were made for a three month session during the summer of 1888. Gottfried Hendricks was hired to teach in the Luchtefeld cabin, the children sat on benches built by Mr. Uhlenkott and Mr. Forsman. Among his pupils were: August, Katie and Lizzie Uhlenkott, George, Annie, Katie and Lena Forsman, Ben, Dick, and Dell Cooper, Bunk and Cap Eller, Bert and Lula Tefft, Joseph, Annie and Theresa Hoffman, and Andrew and Theresa Sprute.

Mr. Hendrichs taught the summer of 1889, Joseph Schultz taught in 1890, his brother August taught the next two years.



THE TIMBER SCHOOL

The Timber School, west of Keuterville on the Thyering ground, had Bertha Trapp, Marie Denson, Miss Gall, Edna Burbow, Miss Selius Greene, Cora Coder, Ella McGrade, Marie Sherman, Bertha Nuttman and Elinor Neis listed as early teachers, plus many whose names were forgotten. In later years, Pat Rustemeyer and Miss Neis, now Mrs. Leo Mader and Mrs. Steve Mader taught. The school was also known as the Schroeder School, and was designated as No. 30 for identification.


Mrs. Steve Mader was the last teacher, and closed the school in 1958.



TIMBER SCHOOL taught by Ella McGrade in 1916




MRS. STEVE MADER retired in 1971 and continues to live on her ranch near Keuterville. She taught a total of 37 years.






Lay people taught until 1918, when Fr. Jerome Veth, O.S.B., secured two sisters, Sister Hedwig and Sister Thecla, to teach, one in the public school and one in the parochial school. Mrs. Walter Sprute was one of the teachers there. Mrs. Louis (Alice) Sprute, Mrs. Steve (Elnora) Mader and Mrs. Leo (Elinor) Mader were the last teachers in Keuterville, closing in 1969 to all go to teach in Cottonwood.









Gobel House near Keuterville, used as a church before one was built.
