









The monastery from which the Jesuits came to care for the Keuterville parish.



Joe Enneking, the eldest son of Frank and Bernadina Enneking, was born March 15, 1893 4½ miles southwest of Keuterville. His early education was in rural schools. He continued a process of self-education and service to the schools of the area as a school trustee for 55 years. In addition to this, Joe served as a 4-H leader for 29 years, and on the Idaho County Fair Board for 3 years; resulting in a building being named after him. He was an Idaho County election judge for 71 years. Enneking Bros. won Grassmen of the Year in 1962.

On October 20, 1925 he married Lizzie Engel. They had twelve children, six sons and six daughters. He and Lizzie were active members of Holy Cross Parish. Joe served his church and community well during his lifetime.

CHARLES J. POXLEITNER 1888-1977

Charles J. Poxleitner, born January 23, 1888 in Bavaria, came to America with his parents in 1888, settling in Wisconsin. He finished the sixth grade in 1902. In 1905 he took a correspondence course in steam engineering and became a registered steam engineer in three states.


In 1908 Charles came to Keuterville. Here he met and married Mary Ann Schmidt on February 13, 1912. To them nine children were born. His wife died of cancer in 1946, there were 53 grandchildren and 72 great grandchildren.

Since 1909 he was an active member of the Knights of Columbus, attaining the Fourth Degree in the Cottonwood Council No. 1389.

From 1934 to 1942 he worked for the Civilian Conservation Corps, known as the C.C.C.'s. He took many pictures during this time and in 1936 started writing articles for the Cottonwood Chronicle, under the title "All in a Lifetime". Being an amateur photographer he developed his own pictures in a hollow cedar tree. He started his first sawmill in 1920, powered by steam, which burned in 1923. His steam operated threshing machine burnt in 1924. In 1943 he again operated a mill which fire destroyed in 1964. He and his sons rebuilt on the same sight where the present Poxleitner Sawmill is located, changing from steam to diesel power, then went to electricity.

He married Margaret Salloman, a native of Budapest, a displaced war victim of World War II, on June 25, 1950.

Charles's mother gave him this advice as a child "Work as though you will live forever and pray as if each day will be your last" and this is how Charles J. Poxleitner lived, spending most of his life in Keuterville.



Keuterville was fortunate on June 15, 1942 when Clarence Nuttman brought his bride Frances Geis of Cottonwood to the Keuterville Community. Frances' super ability in 4-H has brought her awards from 1960 on: 4-H Leader of Idaho County and Volunteer Leader of Idaho County Extension Service presented by Governor Evans in 1981. Her award for 20 years of 4-H work was a watch. Frances accompanied 20 area 4-Hers in 1980 to a Canadian 4-H exchange program.

Frances received a plaque for Community Pride project from Corinne Row, Extension Service of Moscow in 1979. The 4-H club received the Community Pride grant of \$250.00, which was used to renovate the parish hall.

Frances has also cleaned the church since 1965, waters the church lawn, and has held a number of offices of the Christian Mothers.

Her awards and rewards are assets to the Keuterville Community.
