THE Grangeville basketball team went through the scheduled season undefeated, with 17 straight victories. This included three wins over our traditional rival, Cottonwood, and two wins over Craigmont, the leader of the northern division of the prairie conference. No previous record of the Grangeville High School is known to have equaled this one.

In an early season tournament in which the teams of the southern division of the prairie conference participated, the Grangeville Bulldogs emerged victorious, with Kooskia runner-up. Archie Earp, George Bell, and Don Harris were placed on the first all-tournament team, and Bud Doane was placed on the second team.

LEWISTON TOURNAMENT

The team, after winning their opening game from Kendrick with the score of 25 to 11 and defeating Elk River 4! to 19, dropped their next two games and were eliminated from the tournament. Bud Doane was placed on the first all-district team, and Archie Earp was placed on the second all-district team. Archie Earp also was elected the most inspirational player on the team during tournament play.






