Teacher: William, of course.

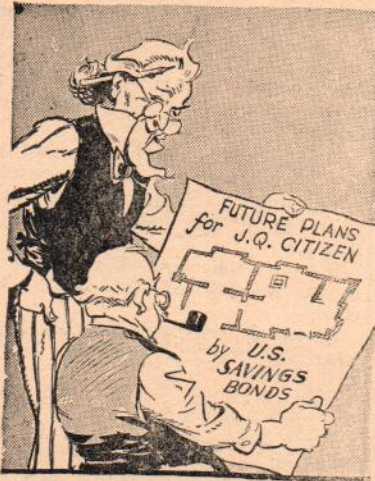
