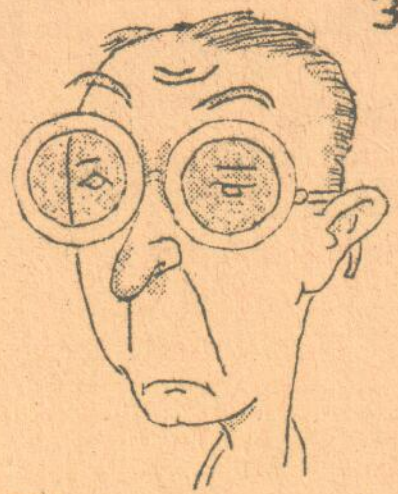
WINS PILOTS LICENSE

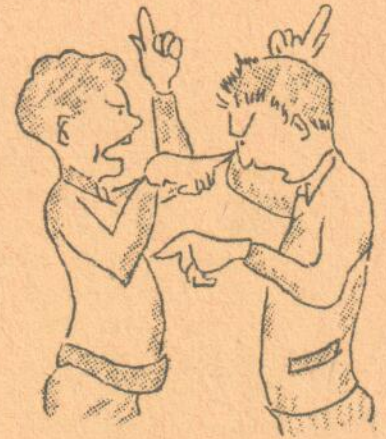
