In the second quarter the Bulldogs got another touchdown when Johnson again skirted the ends for the score. Kissinger picked up another point with his kick to give the Bulldogs a 14-6 lead.

Grangeville kept the Wildcats on the defensive when Johnson threw a long pass to Wagner who carried it to the 5 yard line. Johnson again took the ball over for the touchdown. Kissinger's kick was no good, and the score remained 20-6, as the half ended.

Lapwai came back with a quick one midway in the third period to make the score 20-12. The try for
