At the beginning of the assembly, Student Body President, Bill Wag-ner, will light the tree.


Arrangements have been made to have Santa Claus there, that is, if Don Kissinger is still with us.

Congratulations to the Informal Informer Staff. You turn out a swell paper.—Deloris Chicane.


"CRACKING DOWN ON THE WALLS"
