Grangeville Wins First; Craigmont Second, in Tournament

The Grangeville Bulldogs rolled past the Craigmont Cougars 56-43 to win the championship of the Prairie sub-district class B high school basketball tournament.

Glen Hosley, captain for the Bulldogs, received the tournament championship trophy from Dr. K. H. Collins of Craigmont. Jack Presnell from Craigmont accepted the second-place trophy. Nezerperce was awarded the tournament for third place honors. Last but not least the much talked about sportsmanship trophy was awarded this year to the Ferdinand Eagles, with Norman Cox accepting the award.

Grangeville, which built up a 7-0 lead after three minutes had passed in the first quarter, seemed to be off to a one-sided victory, but Craigmont came back to tie the score and then surge ahead at the end of the initial quarter 17-14. Grangeville fought back in the second quarter to post a 25-20 halftime advantage.

At intermission the majorettes put on a twirling exhibition in total darkness. Part of their uniforms and batons were painted with illuminous paint so that they would show up.

Grangeville turned on the heat in the third quarter with a sizzling, fast break that left little doubt of the outcome.

Hosley, who was a mainstay for the Bulldogs all evening, sparked this 19-point barrage that gave Grangeville a 44-25 margin at the end of the third period. From there Grangeville coasted on to victory despite Craigmont's hopes of regaining the lead.

Hosley, who's backboard work was superb throughout, earned high point honors with 28 points. Bowles followed with 15. Warren Paul led Craigmont with 15.

Both teams will represent the Prairie League in the district tournament at Lewiston Feb. 26—March 3.

Grangeville Downs Nezerperce

Grangeville, which drew a bye in the first round of play in the Prairie sub-district tournament being held here, came into second round of play to overcome a halftime deficit to defeat Nezerperce 48-40.

Glenn Hosley led Grangeville to victory with his fourth quarter scoring. He had left the game in the first quarter after suffering a minor eye injury.

Nezerperce which led 21-18 at the half, stayed in the game with its accuracy at the free-throw line. The

Grangeville led 7-5, 22-18 and 34-26 at the quarter stops, with Glen Hosley showing the way. Then after Grangeville had built its biggest lead of the game, at 40-29. Craigmont began to narrow the gap. While holding Grangeville to a single free-throw they collected 9, but time ran out before the Cougars could get the needed three points.

Hosley topped scoring with 22 and Riggers led Craigmont with 12.

Bullpups Finishing Season

The "B" Squad has had an excellent basketball record this season. They have won 14 out of 17 games, the three losses all being to "A" Squads. The Bullpups have scored a total amount of points of 796 holding their opponents to a total of 447 points.

Holbrook leads the team in scoring having a total of 144 points. He has made 61 out of 130 tries, giving him a 53 percent average. Martin is second with a total of 88 points. He has scored 37 times out of 112 tries, giving him a 30 percent average. Durham is third, with a total of 83 points. He has made 31 out of 74 tries giving him an average of 50 percent.

Martin leads the Bullpups at the free throw line. He has made 14 baskets out of 24 giving him a 54 percent average. Holbrook is second with 22 out of 46 tries, giving him a 48 percent average. Vopat is third with 13 for 36 tries giving him a 36 percent average from the free throw line.

The Bullpups have one more remaining game this season. It is with Kamiah, February 23, at Grangeville.

Jessen, U. S. Office of Education official, who has recently been appointed to the U. S. Treasury's National Committee on School Savings.

"My advice to children and youth in school," Mr. Jessen says, "is to earn money to buy Defense Stamps through service—small jobs. They may be at home, in some store, in the neighbor's yard, in the community. Not all of these jobs will draw pay, but the person who sets out to serve sooner or later finds that he is paid for some of his work."

"Money earned in this way may be spent or it may be invested. If spent it adds to inflation by entering competition for goods already in short supply; and after it has been spent the worker in all likelihood has little or nothing to show for his work. If invested it helps finance the Nation at a time when help is sorely needed; and the investor has promise of money coming to him with interest added which will be useful to him in the future. Earn!
