Cottonwood was the runner-up team of the tournament and these two teams will represent the sub-district at the district tourney to be held in Lewiston next week. Grangeville and Craigmont tied for the sportsmanship trophy, and Craigmont was awarded the tournament basketball, for third place rating.

After Saturday night's game, G. W. (Gib) Eimers, on behalf of the Grangeville Chamber of Commerce, presented the awards to the team captains. Roy Brown, Bulldogs' captain received the awards for his team mates, offering the sportsmanship trophy on hand to Craigmont. A similar one will be obtained for Grangeville. The different teams voted on who should receive the sportsmanship trophy.

Bob Duclos and Don Spencer, Cot-

tonwood co-captains accepted the runner-up award for the Mustangs. Dale Vallem, Craigmont captain, the tournament ball for his team.
