### Students Hear of Prisoners' Life

At the second National Assembly on January 14, 1953. Snow Allen 76, told a story of a prisoners' life from personal experiences. Thirty years ago he was sentenced to 20 years in The Southern Illinois Penitentiary, but was released when he had served 15 years. When he was released he was paid only \$10 for 15 years of hard labor as a cabinet maker. He explained that just one little step the wrong way can lead you to an old cold stone cell three paces wide, for any length of time. He told of the different kinds of people inside the prison walls. There are many whom you would never suspect had committed a crime. There are people of all professions, college students, high school students, and people who cannot read or write.

On October 6, 1923, the date he was released he decided to make it his life work to tell his story to all young Americans. It is his hope that the story of experiences will make a deep impression on the students who have heard him speak. One experience, his worst was when his
