Trim Lewiston 47-44 Overtime Thriller

The Bulldogs edged out the favored Lewiston team 47-44 January 11 on the Bulldogs home floor.

A large crowd saw the Bulldogs come from behind six points with only a minute and a half to go, and tie up the score at 42 all.

The Bengals gave the Bulldogs a scare when Brannon with only three seconds to go missed the free shot that would have given Lewiston the game.

Lewiston made the first basket in the overtime, but Johnson matched it. Suhr then got hot and made a field goal and a free shot to give the Bulldogs a good edge.

This was the Bulldogs first win in A class competition.

Suhr and Johnson were high for the Bulldogs with 13. Dye followed with 10. High man for Lewiston was Ruark with 13.

In the preliminary the Bulldog "B"s were handed their first defeat at the hands of another B squad 64-28.

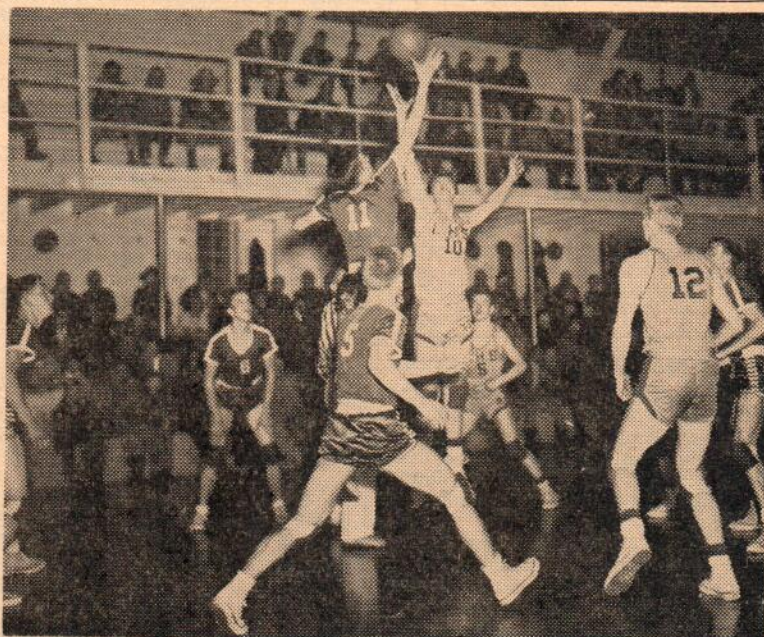
