Grangeville's "high flying A Squad" who's only defeat being to the Kendrick Tigers on the latters floor, have won 9 of the 10 games they have played thus for this sea-

Due to the number of games scheduled this year, the "B" squad has had to play some of the "A" has had to play some of the "A" squad's games in order that they will be eligible for the district tournament at Lewiston. They are only allowed to play twenty games be-fore the district tournament and this counts our sub-district tournament here at Grangeville.

This year Glen Hosley is leading in scoring with a total of 112 points in scoring with a total of 112 points in 10 games for an average of 11.2 points a game. He is followed by Stuart "Bucky" Bowles with a total of 66 points. Bowles has the best average from the floor sinking 29 of the 67 times he had fired at the rim for a 43% average. Aaron Hutchins leads in the free throw department with 5 out of the 6 he had attempted, made good for a 83% attempted, made good for a 83% average. Hosley follows with 42 for 90 for a 47% average.
