## BULLDOGS WIN 3 OUT OF 5

Grangeville, October 28, 1949  
The victory bell was rung again when the Bulldog swamped the Lapwai Wildcats today 14 to 0.

Game time was 2:15 with Lapwai receiving the kick-off on a muddy field. There was no scoring in the first quarter but with two minutes of playing time left in the half, Jerry Fleming, on a series of line plunges, went over to score the first 6 points. Lloyd Ackerman flew the conversion, and the half ended with Grangeville in the lead 7 to 0.

The second half opened with Grangeville receiving. There was no scoring in the second half until toward the end of the fourth quarter when Roy Brown scampered around left end for 6 more points. Ackerman went through for the extra point.

Many times Lapwai tried to score by passing, but even though they didn't, they showed very good sportsmanship.

As this was Grangeville's last game of the season, there will be five vacancies in the first eleven next year; they are Roy Brown, quarterback; Alvin Henderson, tackle; Stanley Pearson, half back; Chet Arnzen, center; and Oscar Johnson, end.
