KENDRICK IDGES GRANGEVILLE

The Kendrick Tigers defeated the Grangeville Bulldogs 6-0, in the first appearance of the season for both clubs.

Parker McCreery, Kendrick querterback, intercepted a Bulldog pass and raced 45 yards into the end zone for the only score of the game. A pass play for extra point was incomplete.

To many fumbles in the first half led Coach Block's charges to defeat. Grangeville thre tened Kendrick's goal line inside the 20 yard line four times only to lose the ball by a fumble.

Grangeville racked up 13 downs, while Kendrick could get but 3. Kendrick's ground attack was completely stymied by the Bulldog's hard rushing line. On the other hand, Grangeville, time after time ripped off large gains only to find themselves needing that one punch to score.

Kendrick never threatened to score throughout the game, except then they got their only touchdown.

Grangeville brought the crowd to their feet in the closing minutes then a pass from Glenn Johnson to end Bill Tagner fell incomplete on the 11 yard line.

BULLDOGS TIE GENESEE 7-7

Grangeville and Genesee battled to a 7-7 tie on the latters home field, October 5. All scoring came in the first half.

Grangeville won the toss of the coin, and elected to receive.

Eimers received the kick-off and ran the bull back to the Grangeville 43 yard line. After a series of downs Johnson kicked. Genesee
took over on their own 20. On the 4th down they kicked, but the
kick was blocked and Grangeville had the ball on the Genesee 19 yard
line. Eimers ran the ball over from the 8 for a TD. Kissenger's
kick was good and Grangeville led 7-0 at the end of the first quarter.

Grangeville seemed headed for another quick touchdown seconds later, when Gilchrist ran down the sidelines for 47 yards to the Genesee 9 yard line. Grangeville failed to gain and was forced to kick.

Genesee immediately struck back with a quick touchdown that brought them all the way from their own 20 to paydirt. Bennet, Genesee halfback, ran the ball over for the extra point and the score was tied at halftime, 7-7.

Defensive play highlighted the second half as both lines stiffened and began to charge harder and force a lot of passing by both teams.

Genesee began a sustained drive late in the fourth quarter, but a 4th down pass was incomplete and the Bullaogs from Grangeville took over on their own 19 yard line. Gene Shira took a hand-off and scampered 20 yards around left end before he was stopped. A pass play was incomplete as the game ended.

BULLDOGS SMOTHER TROY, 53-7

Scoring in every quarter, the Grangeville Bulldogs smothered the Troy Trojans, 53-7.

Before two minutes of playing time had passed in the game, Grangeville had scored. Troy was forced to punt and Grangeville returned the ball back to the 26 yard line. Eimers drove off-tackle for a touchdown. Gilchrist kicked the extra point and the Bulldogs led, 7-0.

Troy was again forced to kick and Eimers returned it 30 yards for another TD. Kissenger's kick was good and Grange-ville led, 14-0.

Grangeville scored again late in the first quarter capping a 82 yard drive. Holbrook picked up 16, and Eimers made 12 for two first downs. Then a pass play netted 43 yards more. Suhr and Johnson each picked up 3 yards. Gilchrist finally smashed over from the 5. Kissenger's kick was again good and the Bulldogs led 21-0 at the end of the 1st. quarter.

With everyone getting a chance to play in the second quarter, the Bulldogs continued to roll to build up a commanding 34-0 halftime lead.

In the second half the Bulldogs opened up with a nifty pass attack which later turned into three more touchdowns. The hard charging line contunued to hold Troy to a standstill while the backfield drove for large gains time after time.

Troy got their only touchdown when White intercepted a Bulldog pass and went 45 yards into the end zone, untouched.

Gilchrist and Eimers each scored 3 touchdowns, while Suhr and Hauger each tallied once.

G.H.S. Likely to Turn Class A School

Grangeville will probably play sports in Class A circles this year rather than class B according to Mr. Vopat.

It is ruled in Idaho that if a school has an enrollment of 250 or over it must play in the A bracket. Grangeville has an enrollment of 255.
