Friday, October 14, the Bulldogs met Troy in their first home game of the season.

The kickoff time was 2:15 p.m. with Flemming doing the kicking for the Bulldogs.

In the first few minutes of play Johnson intercepted a pass, Gilcrest and Flemming each made five yards and Grangeville received a first down.

They lost the ball on downs and then Troy lost it when Stan Pearson intercepted a pass and set up a touch-down which was made when Hauger snatched the ball from the clutches of three Troy men to score. Flemming ran the conversion and it was good making the score 7 to 9 where it stayed until late in the fourth quarter.

Several times during the game Jack Parkins, number 1, doing most of the running and passing for Troy led his team deep into "G" territory many times coming close to scoring only to be called back by penalties.

Then late in the fourth quarter Pearson, Flemming, and Ackerman, regularly a lineman, made several yards through the line and around the ends. Then Johnson flipped Shira a pass which brought the ball down to the three yard line from which Ackerman scored. Flemming tried the conversion but it was no good.

The final score: Grangeville 13, Troy 0.
