The Bulldogs received the kick-off with Jerry Flemming retrieving the ball for 20 yards which started them on a march that went to the Kendrick 5 yard line threatening their

The Bulldogs then lost the ball to the Tigers and after an effortless attempt they kicked. The Bulldogs received the ball and brought it back to the 15 yard line and Eimers ran it over for the first score.

The four touchdowns made by the Bulldogs were made by quarters, one each. Gilchrist made the 2nd score with an end run; Melvin Cash took the pigskin for the 3rd score when he made a good run of 68 yards; Ackerman made the conversion for the 3rd touchdown and the 4th touchdown.

Kendrick's coach, Dennis Roscoe, sent his men in with an offensive Notre Dame Box style, while G.H. S. coaches, Albert Olsen and Jackie Ulrich, sent the home team into a

single wing 5-3-2-1 defense.

Kendrick made 6 first downs.
