Bulldogs Edged By Genesee

In a hard fought game at Memorial Field the Genesee Bulldogs outscored a fighting Grangeville team 19 to 12 last Friday.

Neither team scored in the opening frame, but Genesee drove to the three yard line before the gun sounded.

Taking over where they left off, Genesee drove for the first score. Kagner blocked the kick for extra point, leaving the score 6 to 0.

Genesee drove over for their second touchdown after failing on two previous attempts. Their kick for point was good, putting them in the lead 13 to 0.

Grangeville came back, driving for their first score of the game when Eimers drove through the line. A pass for point failed, leaving the score 13 to 6.

Genesee scored first in the third quarter on an intercepted pass. The try for point failed, ending Genesee's scoring at 19 points.

A pass to Hardin carried him through 7. Eimers then drove over for the final touchdown. A pass again failed for the extra point.

The fourth quarter was scoreless with neither team threatening. The gun sounded with Genesee in possession of the ball and lead, 19-12.

Crowd Enjoys Halftime.

During halftime of the football game, a band show and cross country track meet with Valley High kept the crowd entertained.

The band formed at one end of the field and maneuvered its way into the shape of a football. The football was kicked by a new G. H. S. player, Haroldene Edwards. It broke up into the shape of a V, here they played the G. H. S. fight song. The band then completed their show and filed off the field.

Grangeville won the cross country meet 35 to 21, with Durham coming first. Bob Johnson of Grangeville placed second, Tousignat of Valley High, third; Bob Fisher of Grangeville, fourth; Bill Spivey of Valley High, finished fifth.

Bulldogs Trounce Troy 52-7

The Bulldogs, showing their power in both halves, ran and passed their way to a 52-7 victory over the Trojans.

In the opening quarter Kissinger recovered a Trojan fumble and ran for the first touchdown of the game. His kick for extra point failed, leaving the score 6-0. Eimers added another touchdown for a 12-0 lead. Kissinger's kick was good putting the Bulldogs ahead 13-0. In the second quarter, two touchdowns by Eimers and Kissinger were good for a Bulldog 26-0 half-time lead.

In the second half, Eimers ran the initial kickoff back 88 yards for his fourth touchdown. Small added another and then he ran over the extra point for a 39-0 lead.
