Girls from every town in Idaho are invited to attend. This year 128 girls representing 47 towns attended Girls state.

The girls are given lectures on the way city, state and national government are run and then organize and practice these governments for experience. The girls that are elected governor and lieutenant governor of the state are sent to Girls Nation in Washington D.C.

BACK TO SCHOOL PAPER

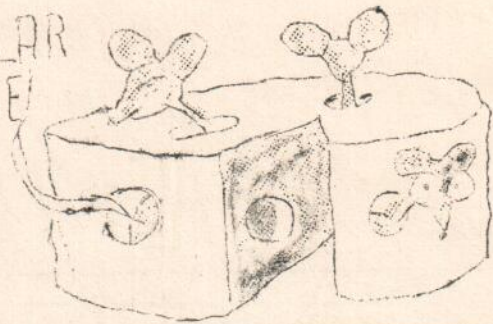
We trudge up the newly painted
