GENESEE AERIAL ATTACK WINS GAME

The Grangeville Bulldogs lost a hard fought game to Genesee Friday at Genesee, by a score of 15 to 0. The first touchdown came in the first quarter by way of a pass from Eikum to Ocks; and the second pass for a touchdown came in the 4th quarter when a Genesee man tackled Glen Johnson behind the home goal post.

Grangeville outdistanced the home club on the ground, but Genesee was able to complete two passes beyond the Grangeville secondary, both good for touchdowns.

At the kickoff Grangeville held Genesee at the thirty-five yard line. Grangeville kept on plugging at every play, but could not hold the Genesee "fliers." At three different times the Grangeville Bulldogs had a fourth down and one to go, but inexperienced ball handling returned the ball to Genesee.

Brown and Gilchrist showed good plugging for Grangeville, but the Genesee line was hard to move. Bowles made several nice punts and Flemming and Stan Pearson, also backfield men, were in a lot of tackles. Stan Pearson made a line pass to Oscar Johnson and Brown also completed several passes. Ackerman was outstanding in plugging line holes and tackling, and the rest of the line men were playing heads-up ball.

Glen Johnson looked good for his first time in competition as did Shira and Bob Pearson.
